Dance - Movement - Mobility

Recently the themes and topics addressed by dance research have shifted and are increasingly influenced by the transnational and interdisciplinary mobility of dancers and researchers as well as the use of technology. Nordic dance, dances, dancers and dance practices are situated within this larger context. What happens with dance and movement in the current cultural climate of mobility? How are concepts specific to dance and dance studies changing according to a world in which mobility is central in so many respects? In which ways can we use dance and dance research to study mobility among other things in relation to categories like class, gender, sexuality and ethnicity? Where/what is the body in the virtual space?


